students take charge of what they need to learn, how they learn it and how they demonstrate their learning, they are developing skills that go beyond content:

Through group projects, they learn collaboration – They learn to lead and listen within a group, to negotiate and compromise with others. They learn how to communicate respectfully and clearly through such discussions.

Empowering students

Through the use of driving questions, learning is personalised – As students are given voice and choice in how they want to explore these questions and create products that demonstrate what they have learned. This process encourages learners to be innovative, critical thinkers. This is especially evident in G100, Project-Based Learning and Personal Projects.

Students also learn the importance of perseverance – Student-led learning is about students overcoming obstacles along the learning journey. They learn not to give up as multiple attempts may be required to complete the stages of a project. This can be seen in our acknowledgement and celebration of failures or mistakes so as to show students that such moments should be confronted and addressed head-on.

Students develop self-regulation – They learn how to manage their time effectively, organise themselves to become more efficient and regulate their behaviors and emotions.

YCIS Beijing is also a big believer in providing feedback that is targeted to individual students' needs. Teacher, peer and parent feedback is strongly encouraged throughout the learning process, so each student has a clear picture of their strengths and of their next steps. At YCIS, we want our students to believe in, and act for a better world. To do this, they need to be independent, curious, life-long learners, and we believe that facilitating student-led learning from a young age will help our students to contribute to the wider world when they are older.
